Introduction

- Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 will no longer have their GCSEs graded A*-G;
- This also applies to Year 11 (2017) in all subjects, apart from Technology and Maths Stats;
- New GCSEs have replaced A*- G with grades 9-1;
- Grade 9 is the highest grade possible.







Explaining GCSE 9-1

• The following information should give you an indication of the grade distribution:

- **Grade 9** is higher than the current A*. It will only be awarded to the top 20% of students achieving a Grade 7 or above across the country
- Grade 8 is the equivalent of the A*/A boundary
- Grade 7 is the bottom of an A







Explaining GCSE 9-1

- Grade 6 is the top 2/3s of a B
- **Grade 5** is the equivalent of the top 1/3 of a C and the bottom 1/3 of a B. The expectation is that the government will make this the new benchmark by which schools are assessed
- Grade 4 is the equivalent of the bottom of an old C grade
